Written by Arthur Miller, *The Price* sees two estranged brothers reunited for the first time in 16 years to divide up their dead parents' estate. One of the brothers stayed in the boys' hometown to care for their sick father while the other left home and forged a successful career as a surgeon.

Set in New York, the play originally opened on Broadway in 1968. In typical Miller fashion the claustrophobic domestic setting quickly becomes a medium for asking bigger questions about society: dealing with family, regret, loyalty and the prices that the individual characters pay in persuing their life choices.

More than an exhibition, *Terracotta Warriors: The Army of the First Emperor of China*, is a journey through one of the most astonishing archaeological finds of the 20th century. After his death, China's first Emperor Qin Shi Huang was sealed into his tomb with a Terracotta Army; over 8,000 life-size clay guardians that remained untouched until their accidental discovery in 1974. Beginning this month, The Ambassador Theatre is offering a chance to get a taste of the world famous attraction by housing over 150 perfect replicas of the Emperor's silent bodyguards.
